






NOTES . . .

RECEIVED A MESSAGE FROM John F. Conklin, Sun City, AZ containing a photo taken in the early 1930s of the George Wilcox house that stood on Wilcox Hill Road before it burned. The photo shows Alfreda Wilcox standing in front with Betty Conklin.



John says: "I remember (the house) well as I spent many of my younger years each summer helping on the farm. It was a great house, and according to family legend, it had early in its life been a stage coach stop on the route to Boston."

He also says "we still own a little piece of property on Wilcox Road on the left side going in, just before the bridge over the brook. George Wilcox gave it to my father so that he would always have a place to fish."

WEDDING DRESSES: Many thanks are due to the kind people who donated or loaned gowns, pictures and related items for our exhibit. Presently we are showing 16 gowns.

We also want to thank all the helpers who created the design details to show the gowns: Walter Dower, whose wooden constructions became the basis for chicken wire dress bodies, Claire Frisbie for allowing us to wrap her in three layers of duct tape to create a form, and Chris Sullivan, Vivian Dower, Martha Lutecki, and Regina Woltmann who helped to collect and arrange the exhibit.

WHEATLEY THEME. Lois Wheatley, Athens, Ohio, sent an interesting paper (prepared for an Ohio University course), describing early Connecticut settlement, relations to the Indians, and the family route to Ohio.

Her branch of the Ranney family arrived in Middletown Upper Houses (Cromwell) in 1659. Members settled in East Middletown (Portland) in 1717, living near the present Prospect Street. They allied themselves with many local families, Hubbards, Turners, Millers, Dixons and Bucks. Later generations were drawn to life in the Connecticut "Western Reserve Land" in Ohio. Copies of the paper are available at the Museum.

SELF-GUIDED OPEN-HOUSE TOUR

Plans are well underway by the Historical Society for a house tour fundraiser. The self-guided tour, "**Yesterday and Today**", features Portland homes from the 1700's through the present, will be held Sunday, October 22 from 12 noon to 5 p.m., rain or shine.

The tour will include **nine beautiful homes plus Trinity Church, and the Ruth Callander House Museum** of Portland History. Guides will point out architectural details and points of interest in each of the owner-occupied homes and buildings on the tour.

A highlight of the tour will be the **George Gillum, Jr. House** located on Main Street, **owned by James and Martha McCabe**. Three rooms in the original home built in 1850 will be open for public viewing with local artisans displaying their crafts. The showcase will include reproduction and antique dolls, sculptures, quilts, and bonsai trees. Also on this property is a large copper beech tree which has been registered on the Connecticut's Notable Tree List maintained by Connecticut College in New London.

The **Daniel Russell House, circa 1855**, now the Greystone Residential Care Home **owned by Lucille Swanson**, is one of Portland's few good examples of high style late Italianate architecture. Several new additions to the property, most recently in 2005, elegantly blend the old Italianate and new contemporary styles. Greystone will be open to tour visitors from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m.

Among the earlier homes on the tour is the **Elisha Covell House**, a stately Greek Revival, circa 1856, **owned by John and Susan Decina**. According to local legend, this home may have been part of the under-ground railroad as it has a hidden trapdoor in one the bedrooms.

The **Jarvis House, owned by Michael Gambaccini and Ian Tovey**, is a charming Victorian furnished with late 19th century furniture and period lighting. The home retains many original features such as an exquisite built-in fretwork screen and battery operated servants call bells.

Two homes built in the early 1900's are also featured on the tour. The **Cornwall Farmhouse of Richard and Judy Lane**, a two-story colonial, is stylishly decorated with many antiques and collectibles. The tobacco barn on the grounds will be open for public viewing. The **Edwin G. Camp House, an elegant Georgian style colonial owned by Thomas and Linda Melia**, is nestled on the hillside overlooking historic Main Street. The entire house including a carriage/pool house and beautiful gardens may be toured.

Two of the new homes on the tour were built in 2005 as part of the HOBI Award winning Bartlett Hill subdivision for active adults. The traditional or "Dorset" model, **owned by Dick and Elaine Carella**, offers spacious rooms, a hand-painted mural and scenic hillside views. The new cape or "Berkshire" model, **home to Myron and Jane Foster**, is attractively decorated with an early American theme featuring many collectibles.

The newest home on the tour, completed this year for **Peter and Jeannette Scianna**, is designed around an expansive English conservatory overlooking spectacular views of the Connecticut River and beyond. The use of glass, natural light and modern layout make this a showcase home.

The Society's Museum, the oldest house on the tour (1715), will be open for visitors and features a special exhibit of wedding fashions and memorabilia from the 1800's through the present. A tour of the museum's grounds will also allow guests to view The Betty Keser Scott Garden designed, planted, and maintained by the Portland Garden Club.

Trinity Church will be open for tours and light refreshments from 2 to 5 p.m. Donations of baked goods from society members would be greatly appreciated. Please call Joan at 342-1122.

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Tickets are \$20 in advance and \$25 the day of the tour. Advance tickets can be purchased by mailing the order form below or by calling Sue, 342-0433; Joan, 342-1122; Judi, 342-3397 or Nancy, 342-0583. Tickets also available at the Museum on open days.
