Seeking a Small Rural House From 1903...

Last month, the Society was contacted by Eve Kahn, an antiques columnist for the New York Times and a freelance writer specializing in architecture, design, and preservation. Ms. Kahn was researching a female Impressionist painter, Mary Rogers Williams (1857-1907). Mary Rogers Williams was a Hartford native who often visited her "Aunt Willie," Wilhelmina Niven Williams Pelton, who lived with husband Nelson Pelton on Maple Road in Portland. Wilhelmina Williams had married Nelson Pelton after his first wife died at age 24.

Ms. Kahn had seen Mary Rogers Williams' drawing (see page 4) of a 2-over-3-bay house -- a little cottage really -- and wondered if it might be in our town, since Mary spent time here in the later 19th century. It was a gable-to-street structure, with two windows in the small upstairs, and two windows, plus a door on the left side of the façade, on the first floor. (A "bay" can be either a door or a window.)

The little house stood on a slight hill of some sort, with a road or driveway running through the lower left corner of the picture. Immediately I thought of the small house at 305 Old Marlborough Turnpike -- that house had very similar dimensions. But a drive up there told me that, when viewed from the street, it had THREE bays -- three windows -- in the upstairs, and three bays down, two windows and a door on the left side. So I was flummoxed for a time.

I did check the only other "2-over-3" item in Portland History & Architecture, but it was a small ridge-to-street house at 112 Cotton Hill Road -- not our gable-to-street item.

Then Chris Sullivan emailed her son Eric, who lives in upper New York state, and they found a view on Bingmaps.com which shows the BACK of 305 Old Marlborough Turnpike -- with only two upstairs windows, and two downstairs windows with an apparent doorway to the left!

So likely Ms. Kahn's piece was drawn of 305 Old Marlborough Turnpike, but drawn from the rear of the building, where Mary Rogers Williams chose to sit! One wonders if she might have been intimidated by all the ca. 1900 traffic...

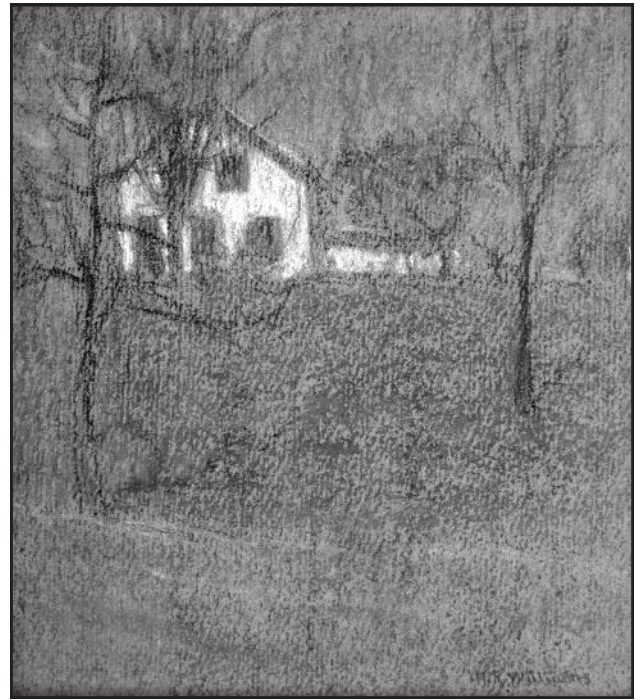
